Dear Board of Housing and Community Development Members,

I write today to express my concerns with the Board?s failure to update Virginia?s Uniform Building Codes to standards guided by energy efficiency.

Virginia law, since 2021, requires that the Board of Housing and Community Development (BHCD) building code process consider the benefits and costs of adopting the current International Energy Efficiency Code (IECC). Evaluation of these beneficial construction techniques in compliance with Virginia law did not occur. This means that homes built in Virginia will continue to be less energy efficient so the occupant pays higher utility bills month after month and year after year. This needs to change. The BHCD needs to prioritize the benefits to the homeowners and renters over cutting costs for the builder community.

A broad collection of public and private experts produced the model 2021 IECC construction code. If fully implemented by Virginia, it would reduce pollution and yield substantial savings in energy costs which would continue for decades. The cost savings and other benefits of more strident energy efficiency codes have been documented by the U.S. Department of Energy.

As directed by Virginia law, the statewide building code should be ?at least as stringent as? the International Energy Conservation Code (IECC) since the energy savings, pollution reductions and other benefits from greater efficiency exceed the added cost of construction.

I humbly request that BHCD members seek to approve uniform building codes standards that reflect the 2021 IECC guidelines as directed by state law.

Subject: Virginia building codes are costing us homeowners

Hi Jeff, there needs to be a major change in Virginia building codes to protect the home owner as so far, every home I've purchased in Virginia has cost me considerably by builders using experimental or cheap materials. For example, in a condo in Fairfax, Virginia the builder was allowed to use some sort of experimental composite "copper" pipe and almost every pipe had to be replaced due to leaks appearing randomly throughout the pipe and even on runs of the pipe with no seams or connecting points. Then I bought a townhouse with poly butylene pluming no knowing any better and that cost me 20k and now I'm having to replace the cheap flexible air ducts after 20 years and that's going to cost another 20k. And formerly coming from Maryland, now appreciate the more stringent building codes they have there or had there at one time.

But bottom line is, builders are selling us homes at astronomical prices and using cheap materials that cost us even more down the road, so I'm going to be taking my complaints to the highest levels in Virginia and the Federal government to put a stop to builders being able to legally rip off we customers!

Here are a few ideas for changes in the Virginia building code.

• New housing should be required to have an environmentally friendly roof. Builders should choose between:

- 1. A rooftop garden
- 2. Solar panels
- 3. White or solar reflective roofing materials
- 4. Any combination of these

• If an old roof is being completely replaced, the new roof should conform to the standard above. Berm houses can be exempted from the roofing requirement if plants can grow on top of them.

• Gas stoves, dryers, water heaters, and heating units should be prohibited in new residential housing.

• All new residential housing should be wired in a way that facilitates recharging electric vehicles. Every new single-family house should be wired for recharging stations. New apartment buildings should have at least one recharging station per unit, preferably connected to the residential unit so that the cost of recharging is included in the resident's electric bill, or paid by the building owner. (The rent can be set to cover the cost of recharging EVs).

• Instead of asphalt or concrete driveways and sidewalks, porous materials such as gravel or paving stones with holes in them should be used to reduce runoff. Cobblestones can be recycled more easily than old concrete or asphalt. Ideally, paving materials should light in color to reflect sunlight.

• In newly developed areas and where possible, electricity should be provided through underground cables. This will reduce power outages during storms.

There should also be new restrictions on new commercial construction.

• Sprawling parking lots around shopping centers make stores less accessible for shoppers traveling on foot or by bicycle, and they do not absorb rain water. Where feasible, parking should be under commercial buildings rather than around them. New large commercial areas should be required to have multi-level parking structures so that not so much land is dedicated to parking, and one-level parking lots should be paved with water-permeable materials.

• New commercial buildings and parking structures should be required to have rooftop solar panels or other environmentally friendly roofing.

• Newly constructed parking structures and parking lots should include recharging stations for electric vehicles (possibly utilizing power from the solar panels on the roofs).
