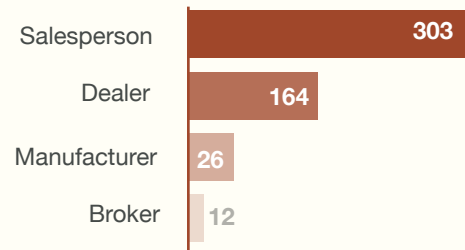

STATE BUILDING CODE TECHNICAL REVIEW BOARD (SBCTRB)

SBCTRB's primary purpose is to hear appeals from enforcement actions under building, fire and other related regulations. This board also issues formal interpretations on code issues and recommends changes to regulations based on its decisions and interpretations.

The SBCTRB consists of 14 citizens appointed by the governor. By law, the organizations represented by the board members are: the Virginia Society of the American Institute of Architects, Virginia Society of Professional Engineers, Home Builders Association of Virginia, Virginia Branch of the Associated General Contractors of America, Virginia Building and Code Officials Association, State Fire Chiefs Association of Virginia, Virginia chapters of the National Apartment Association and Virginia Association of Plumbing-Heating-Cooling Contractors.

Departures and New Members

Robert J. Allen, CBO, resigned as chairman of SBCTRB after 21 years of dedicated service. Allen provided thoughtful, well-reasoned leadership to the board throughout his many years of service. As a plan reviewer for Henrico County with many years of code enforcement experience, Allen brought extensive knowledge in application of the code. Both his approach and his knowledge will be missed. We acknowledge and thank him for his decades of service. Matthew Arnold resigned from SBCTRB after 13 years of service representing AIA Virginia. Arnold was appointed in 2004 to the board by then Gov. Mark Warner.

Richard C. Witt, of North Chesterfield, was appointed to SBCTRB by Gov. Terry McAuliffe as a representative of the Virginia Building and Code Officials Association in December 2017. Witt is currently the director of building inspection for Chesterfield County and has served Chesterfield County for 32 years in various capacities. He has dedicated his professional career to the building codes industry. He serves as an executive committee member for the International Code Council Region VII and is a lifetime member of the Virginia Plumbing and Mechanical Inspectors Association. He was instrumental in the expansion of the Virginia Building Code Academy and the Building Code Academy Advisory Committee. Witt was also the recipient of the 2016 Gerald H. Jones Code Official of the Year award from the International Code Council.



VIRGINIA MANUFACTURED HOUSING BOARD

VMHB promulgates the licensing regulations to carry out the requirements for licensing of manufactured home manufacturers, dealers, brokers and salespersons.

VMHB is comprised of nine members, appointed by the governor, representing specific groups designated in the enabling legislation. The VMHB adopts and, with assistance of DHCD staff, carries out the enforcement of the Manufactured Housing Licensing and Transaction Recovery Fund Regulations. The board is responsible for licensing manufactured home dealers, brokers, manufacturers and the salespersons working for those companies, and they are authorized to receive consumer complaints on manufactured homes and make case decisions as necessary to resolve certain complaints.

In 2017, only one complaint was unresolved and moved to VMHB. This is a decrease from past years, in part, due to a consistent and thorough audit program and industry cooperation.

Two board members resigned during 2017 prior to the end of their appointed terms. Ben Flores and Dennis Jones both represented manufacturers on the board.

Additionally, one new board member was appointed by Gov. McAuliffe last year. Sean Hicks, an associate from Hirschler Fleischer, was appointed as a public representative to the board.

MANUFACTURED HOUSING

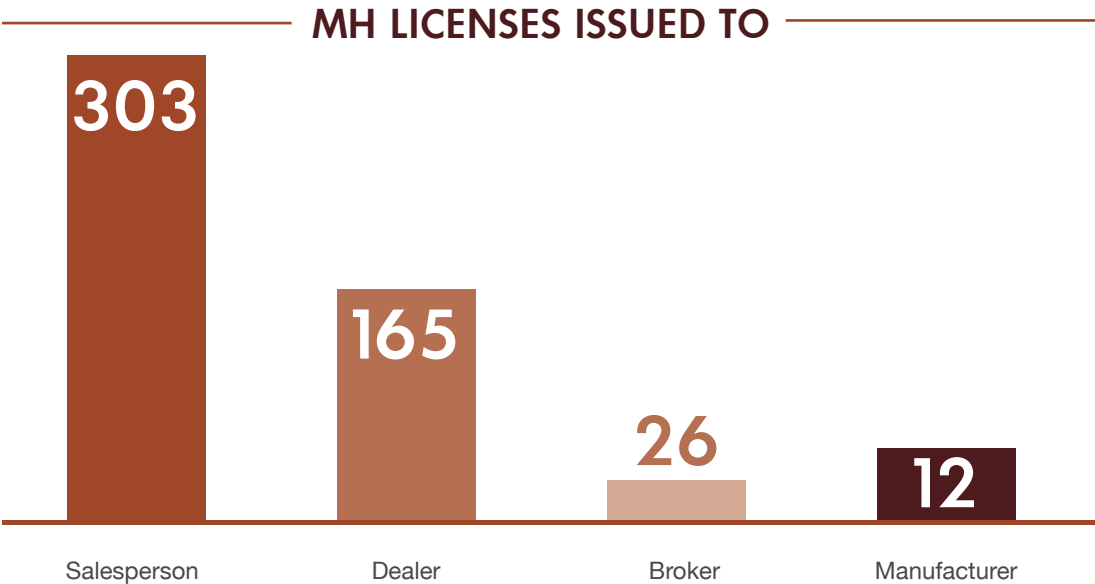
The Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) regulates Virginia’s manufactured housing industry through the Virginia Manufactured Home Safety Regulations (MHSR) and the Virginia Manufactured Housing Licensing and Transaction Recovery Fund Regulations (MHLTRFR).

All licenses, except temporary or special licenses, are issued for a one-year period and must be renewed annually.

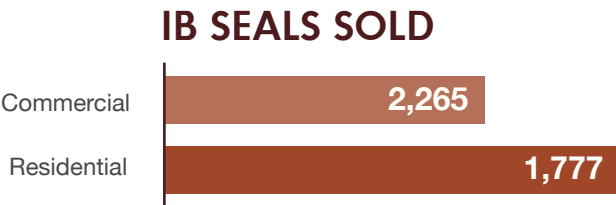

INDUSTRIALIZED BUILDING SAFETY REGULATIONS (IBSR)

IBSR regulates industrialized buildings (IB), often referred to as modular buildings. IBSR provides for the administration and enforcement of uniform statewide standards. The Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development is the building official for IBs. DHCD accredits third-party Compliance Assurance Agencies (CAA) to review designs, inspect construction and certify the buildings through the application of a Virginia Registration Seal, and the performance of the CAA is monitored by DHCD.



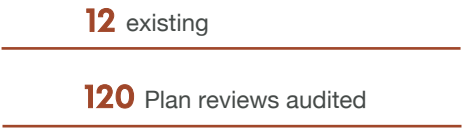

CODE DEVELOPMENT PROCESS

DHCD prides itself on its building code development process. The implementation of cdpVA software has fostered inclusion and transparency in the code development process throughout the state. Through the platform, stakeholders can submit, view and comment on code change proposals anytime, anywhere. A new feature was added to cdpVA allowing public comments to proposals. This gives the public the ability to directly comment on any proposal submitted through the system.

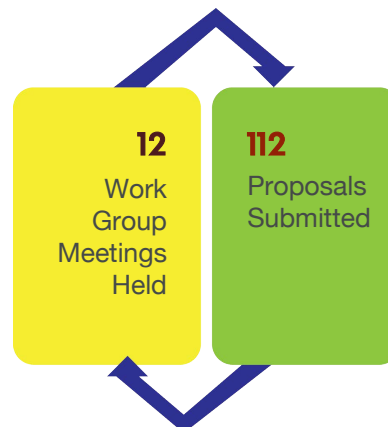
Several sub-workgroups were convened and various stakeholders collaborated to work on the following issues that resulted in successful code change proposals:

Energy: The most notable provision is the removal of the visual option for duct testing. Other items include providing mechanical ventilation for multifamily dwelling units, maintaining the simplified solar heat gain coefficient fenestration requirements and incentivizing the use of the Energy Rating Index by allowing on-site renewable energy to be included in the calculation and raising the index score.

Special Inspections: This will allow the local building official to waive special inspections and tests. Also, it provides a threshold based on size and height rather than the requirement of professional design.

Wireless Communication: This clarifies the existing language concerning support structures controlled by the electric power companies and adds an exemption for direct-burial poles used for wiring of communication, information or cable television services.

Manufactured Housing: This adds a provision to the Virginia Maintenance Code addressing legislation passed by the General Assembly concerning manufactured home park tenant notification.

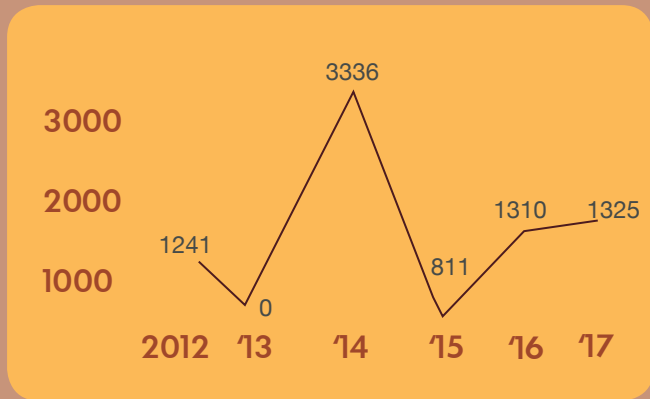

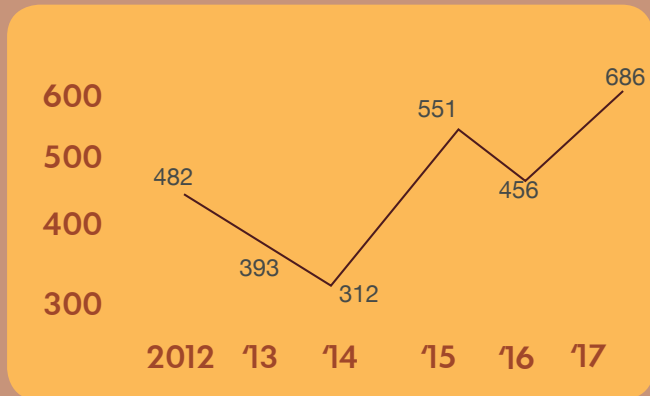

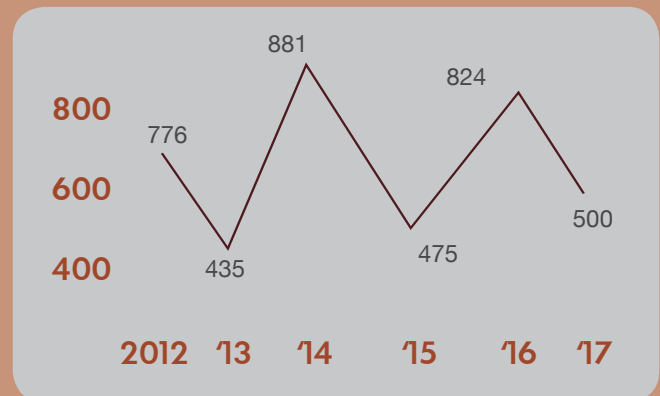

Train the Trainer Program

Working with VCU's PMG, the academy offered its 11-day Train the Trainer course to subject-matter experts throughout the commonwealth. Thirteen students completed the five-day classroom experiential learning, followed by an additional six days of intense presentation skills evaluation. The course graduated new apprentice instructors in the disciplines of electrical, mechanical, plumbing, fire systems and building inspections, as well as plan review.



VA Code Education Conference (VCEC)

Staff were directly involved in the planning and management of the inaugural Virginia Code Education Conference held in Charlottesville in July 2017. This was a collaborative effort with Virginia code and professional organizations actively participating. More than 220 code officials, design professionals and others attended this three-day event featuring training sessions, networking events and keynote speakers.

Agency Support

- Supported training effort with the Division of Community Development
- Commonwealth of Virginia Campaign (CVC) annual fundraising; DHCD raised more than \$17,956 for charity in 2017
- Learning Management System (LMS) Evaluating options and providing recommendations for a system to be used and shared across the division
- Partnered with other state agencies including:
 - Virginia Department of Fire Programs (VDFP) for the development of the Statewide Fire Prevention Code (SFPC).
 - Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (VDEQ) for collaboration on regulations for alternative water supplies.

Blueprint for the Future

VIRGINIA BOARD OF HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT (BHCD)

BHCD was integral to the completion of the code update process during 2017. The board reviewed a total of 112 proposed changes to the various DHCD construction and safety regulations. The proposals were vetted through various BHCD committee meetings prior to final approval by the board. The process for the board included:

- Two meetings of the Statewide Fire Prevention Code Development Committee
- Two meetings of the Codes and Standards Committee
- One joint meeting with the Virginia Fire Services Board and BHCD
- Final approval of the final regulations on Oct. 16, 2017
